Today is the third sermon in our August series on Colossians. As we look at Colossians 2:8-15, the three hymns are connected in the following ways to the Scripture:

- Gathering Hymn: "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name!" Colossians 2:10b
- Hymn of the Day: "Baptized in Water" Colossians 2:12
- Sending Hymn: "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God" Colossians 2:15

The prelude, a setting of our sending hymn, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God," was also played yesterday morning for the memorial service of Carol Hayes-Christiansen. In addition to a career as a professor in the College of Nursing at UF, Carol sang in the First Presbyterian Church Chancel Choir for many years and was director of one of the handbell ensembles. Our Thursday handbell ensemble, "Carol Ringers," is named after Carol.

This morning we celebrate our second annual Bell Day. Various parts of worship utilize handbells or handchimes. In addition to the group handbell piece for the prelude, we see handbells used with a belltree for the anthem, solo ringing for the offertory, and handbells as part of two of the hymns.

We are grateful to Dr. Elaine Turner for sharing her handbell gifts with us today. From 2006 through 2024 she served the UF College of Agricultural and Life Sciences as Associate Dean, Senior Associate Dean, and Dean. As a handbell ringer, she has traveled nationally and internationally.

Thanks also to Andrew Netardus for leading our Bell Day workshop at 10:15 a.m. and for directing and playing handbells at our 11 a.m. worship. Andrew works with our Wednesday Jubilate Ringers ensemble, other facets of the music ministry at First Presbyterian Church, and as Event Coordinator.

Thank you for joining us in worship today. We pray that you experience Christ's presence in our midst and that His presence will sustain you in the week ahead. Visitors are welcome to participate in the worship and the work of First Presbyterian Church. 263 All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name!



This 18th-century text celebrating the sovereignty of Christ has been through several expansions and contractions before reaching its present form. It is set here to the oldest American hymn tune in continuous use since first published in 1793, which was written for it.

New Testament Reading

Colossians 2:8-15 (NRSV)

⁸ See to it that no one takes you captive through philosophy and empty deceit, according to human tradition, according to the elemental spirits of the universe, and not according to Christ. ⁹ For in him the whole fullness of deity dwells bodily, ¹⁰ and you have come to fullness in him, who is the head of every ruler and authority. ¹¹ In him also you were circumcised with a spiritual circumcision, by putting off the body of the flesh in the circumcision of Christ; ¹² when you were buried with him in baptism, you were also raised with him through faith in the power of God, who raised him from the dead. ¹³ And when you were dead in trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made you alive together with him, when he forgave us all our trespasses, ¹⁴ erasing the record that stood against us with its legal demands. He set this aside, nailing it to the cross. ¹⁵ He disarmed the rulers and authorities and made a public example of them, triumphing over them in it.



JESUS CHRIST: ASCENSION AND REIGN





Long before Isaac Watts began to Christianize the Psalms, Martin Luther had already done so when he created the text and tune for this, his most famous hymn, which is based on Psalm 46. Luther encouraged metrical versions of psalms as well as chanted psalms and new hymns.



OUR HANDBELLS



First Presbyterian Church purchased its first set of handbells in 1972. This set was cast by the Whitechapel Foundry, an organization founded in London in Elizabethan times. It cast bells for four hundred

years, many of them famous, including 'Big Ben', which rings from the North Tower of the Houses of Parliament, and the original 'Liberty Bell' of Philadelphia, famous for having cracked on its first ring. Whitechapel bells also ring at Salisbury Cathedral, Westminster Abbey, and the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. The foundry cast its last bell in 2017.

Our Whitechapel Bells rang for the first time at FPC during the Christmas Eve Service, 1973, as the choirs and congregation left the sanctuary carrying candles representing Christ, the Light of the world. In the first week of January, Mary McCleary, New England chairman of the American Guild of English Handbell Ringers (and a guest of Carol Hayes-Christiansen), rang the bells for the ending of our Epiphany communion service. By these symbolic

acts we dedicated the handbells to the glory of God and the enrichment of our corporate worship.

After hearing a handbell choir while in Thailand, Dr. and Mrs. J. Wayne Reitz gifted First Presbyterian with three middle octaves of Whitechapel Handbells in 1972 and an additional two octaves in 1991.



In September 2020, a new four-octave set of handbells crafted by Malmark was rung for the first time in our worship. First Presbyterian Church is grateful to Carol Hayes-Christiansen, Bruce and Roberta Curry, and Allen and Elaine Turner for their generosity in underwriting, in part, the purchase of the Malmark handbells. Additional funding was provided by the Esther

Jones Endowment and the Sacred Music Fund.

With three weekly rehearsals for the Jubilate, Carol, and Joyful Ringers as well as countless preludes, offertories, postludes, handbell tours, and concerts at Oak Hammock and The Village, the Whitechapel handbells have rung joyfully and clearly for 50 years. We look forward to ringing the Whitechapel and Malmark handbells in praise to God for the next 50 years.

THE STEEPLE BELL



The steeple bell that rings each Sunday morning has called our congregation to worship since 1860 when it was installed in our firstnewly-built church building; the population of Gainesville then was fewer than 400. In 1890, when the population of Gainesville had grown to 10,000, the bell followed when we moved to our second

church home on the corner of West University and 6th Street. It followed once again in 1954 when we moved to our third home, the building we now occupy.

Our bell was cast in the Meneely Foundry in Troy, NY, then a small town on the Hudson River just north of Albany. Between 1826 and 1952, when the foundry closed, it made more than 65,000 bells, many of them installed on college campuses such as Cornell, Colgate, Duke, Mt. Holyoke, and the University of Texas, but also in several nearby churches, Bethesda by the Sea in Palm Beach (1927), St. John's Episcopal in Jacksonville (1948), and St. John's Episcopal in Savannah (1939).


