As we look at *The Church as Bride*, the music speaks to this idea in different ways. Some of the pieces include themes of love and weddings. For example, *Salut d'amour*, originally titled Liebesgruß (Love's Greeting), was composed as a wedding gift and is a popular, enduring, romantic work. Edward Elgar finished the piece in July 1888, when he was romantically involved with Caroline Alice Roberts, and he called it "Liebesgruss" ('Love's Greeting') because of Miss Roberts' fluency in German. On their engagement she had already presented him with a poem, "The Wind at Dawn," which he set to music, and when he returned home to London on 22 September from a holiday at the house of his friend Dr. Charles Buck in Settle, he gave her *Salut d'Amour* as an engagement present. Other music in today's worship points to Jesus through songs of praise. As we think of the church as bride, Jesus has made us holy and we are redeemed through him. "A Mighty Fortress" is a hymn of praise to God, but also serves as a nod to the Reformation, which is often celebrated on the last Sunday in October.

We are thankful to Linda Weltner and Seoyon Rho for sharing their gifts for the prelude. In addition to worshiping at First Presbyterian Church, Linda is a University of Florida College of Fine Arts alumna. She was a Jacksonville Symphony Masterworks player for many years and continues freelance solo performance, study, and teaching. Seoyun Rho, a dedicated pianist, holds a Doctorate in Piano Performance at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign, and possesses an impressive musical journey that includes graduating from Oberlin Conservatory and Indiana University with a bachelor's and master's degree, respectively.

Under the guidance of renowned instructors such as Haewon Song and Karen Shaw, Seoyun has performed captivating recitals at prestigious venues, including Yiwon Munhwa Center in Seoul, Korea, and Beck Center in Cleveland, Ohio. She has also enriched her musical skills by participating in international music festivals, including the Euro Arts Music Festival in Leipzig, Germany, and the Gijon International Piano Festival in Gijon, Spain, while benefiting from master classes with distinguished pianists like James Tocco and Wha Kyung Byun. Campbell Graze is our offertory soloist. He is a tenor choral scholar in the Chancel Choir and is working towards his bachelor's in Applied Physiology and Kinesiology at UF.


